

Systematic list of birds 2004

These are the 198 species (of which 17 red data species and 21 endemics of NE Brazil) seen by me on my two-week trip to Bahia in 2004. On this trip I only birded on 7 mornings, therefore this list is not very impressive. Species with an E for its name are endemic to **NE Brazil**. Red data species are also marked.

Again, English and scientific names are according to Deodato Souza's All the birds of Brazil (2002), with updates about taxonomy extracted from various books and magazines.

1. White-bellied Tinamou – *Nothura boraquira*

Chapada Diamantina – one flushed near the marsh just north of Lencois.

2. Great Egret - *Egretta alba*

Fairly common.

3. Snowy Egret - *Egretta thula*

A few birds seen.

4. Striated Heron – *Butorides striatus*

Fairly common

5. Cattle Egret - *Bubulcus ibis*

Locally very common.

6. White-faced Tree-Duck – *Dendrocygna viduata*

While heading to Chapada Diamantina 15 birds in a lake.

7. White-checked Pintail – *Anas bahamensis*

While driving to Chapada Diamantina 7 birds in a lake.

8. Southern Pochard - *Netta erythrophthalma*

While driving to Chapada Diamantina 6 birds in 2 little lakes.

9. Black Vulture - *Coragyps atratus*

Common.

10. Turkey Vulture - *Cathartes aura*

Common.

11. Lesser Yellow-headed Vulture - *Cathartes burrovianus*

Small numbers.

12. White-tailed Kite - *Elanus leucurus*

Chapada Diamantina – one near Palmeiras

13. Black-chested Buzzard-Eagle - *Geranoastur melanoleucus*

One on the road to Chapada Diamantina.

14. Roadside Hawk - *Buteo magnirostris*

Small numbers.

15. Yellow-headed Caracara – *Milvago chimachima*

Small numbers.

16. Southern Caracara – *Polyborus plancus* (Northern Caracara is recently split)

Small numbers.

17. Aplomado Falcon - *Falco femoralis*

Chapada Diamantina – one bird near the marsh just north of Lencois

18. Grey-necked Wood-Rail – *Aramides cajanea*

Dirtroad Jeremoabo-Canudos – 3 birds early morning near a little marsh.

19. Wattled Jacana - *Jacana jacana*

Small numbers.

20. Southern Lapwing – *Vanellus chilensis*

Common.

21. Black-bellied Plover – *Pluvialis squatarola*

Small numbers.

22. Semipalmated Plover – *Charadrius semipalmatus*

Small numbers along the coast.

23. Ruddy Turnstone – *Arenaria interpres*

Small numbers along the coast.

24. Solitary Sandpiper - *Tringa solitaria*

Dirtroad Jeremoabo-Canudos – small numbers.

25. Spotted Sandpiper - *Acitis macularia*

Small numbers.

26. Picazuro Pigeon - *Columba picazuro*

Small numbers.

27. Eared Dove – *Zenaida auricultata*

Canudos – small numbers.

28. Common Ground-Dove - *Columbina passerina*

Canudos – small numbers.

29. Plain-breasted Ground-Dove - *Columbina minuta*

Common inland.

30. Ruddy Ground-Dove – *Columbina talpacoti*

Common.

31. Picui Ground-Dove – *Columbina picui*

Fairly common.

32. Scaled Dove – *Scardafella squammata*

Common.

33. Ruddy Quail-Dove – *Geotrygon montana*

Chapada Diamantina – at least one near the marsh just north of Lencois.

E 34. Lear's or Indigo Macaw – *Anodorhynchus leari* – CRITICAL

Dirtroad Jeremoabo-Canudos – 6 birds at the famous fazenda at 9am, feeding on the licuri palms. The birds arrive at the fazenda's 2-3 hours after sunrise to feed. They sleep 100s km away in the canyons, where Sick finally tracked this species down in 1978. Apart from the dirtroad, transport to this site is easy and visiting this last site for this species is no longer 'a mini-expedition like in Bruce Forrester's days.

35. Blue-winged Macaw – *Propyrrhura maracana* – VULNERABLE

Dirtroad Jeremoabo-Canudos – small numbers.

E 36. Cactus or Caatinga Parakeet - *Aratinga cactorum*

Dirtroad Jeremoabo-Canudos, Dirtroad south of Canudos, Chapada Diamantina – common.

Boa nova – small numbers.

37. Peach-fronted Parakeet - *Aratinga aurea*

Small numbers.

E 38. Golden-capped Parakeet - *Aratinga auricapilla* – VULNERABLE

Porto Seguro Private Reserve – one group of 15 birds.

39. Reddish-bellied or Maroon-bellied Parakeet – *Pyrrhura frontalis*

Boa Nova – 5 birds in the canopy of the wet forest.

40. Blue-winged Parrotlet – *Forpus xanthopterygius*

Common.

41. Plain Parakeet – *Brotogeris titica*

Common.

42. Blue-headed Parrot – *Pionus menstruus reichenowi*

Porto Seguro Private Reserve – 5 birds of the eastern subspecies with the blue breast and belly.

43. Red-crowned Amazon - *Amazona rhodocorytha* – ENDANGERED

Porto Seguro Private Reserve – 3 birds.

44. Squirrel Cuckoo - *Piaya cayana*

Chapada Diamantina – common in forests.

45. Guira Cuckoo - *Guira guira*

Common.

46. Burrowing Owl – *Athene cunicularia*

Common inland.

47. Pauraque – *Nyctidromus albicollis*

Common when spotlighting near touristic areas along the coast.

48. Fork-tailed Palm-Swift – *Reinarda squamata*

Chapada Diamantina – small numbers just north of Lencois

49. Brown Violet-ear – *Colobri delphinea*

Chapada Diamantina – one bird.

50. Planalto Hermit – *Phaethornis pretrei*

Small numbers along the coast at touristic places.

Chapada Diamantina – common at the feeders at Casa da Geleia in Lencois.

Boa Nova – one bird in the wet forest.

E 51. Broad-tipped Hermit – *Phaethornis gounellei*

Chapada Diamantina – an excellent sighting of one bird at the Great Xenops spot near Palmeiras.

52. Reddish Hermit – *Phaethornis ruber*

Porto Seguro Private Reserve – one bird.

Una EcoParque – one bird.

53. Swallow-tailed Hummingbird - *Eupetomena macroura*

Small numbers.

54. Frilled Coquette - *Lophornis magnifica*

Chapada Diamantina – one female at the feeders at Casa da Geleia, the pousada in Lencois run by English speaking Brazilian birder Jose Carlos.

55. Glittering-bellied Emerald – *Cholorostibon aureoventris*

Small numbers along the coast.

Dirtroad Jeremoabo-Canudos – small numbers.

56. Violet-capped Woodnymph – *Thalurania glaucopis*

Chapada Diamantina – common at the feeders at Casa da Geleia, the pousada in Lencois run by English speaking Brazilian birder Jose Carlos.

57. Versicolored Emerald – *Amazilia versicolor*

Chapada Diamantina – common at the feeders at Casa da Geleia, the pousada run by English speaking Brazilian birder Jose Carlos.

58. Glittering-throated Emerald - *Amazilia fimbriata*

Very common along the coast.

Chapada Diamantina – common at the feeders at Casa da Geleia, the pousada run by English speaking Brazilian birder Jose Carlos.

E 59. Hooded Visorbearer – *Augastas lumachellus* – NEAR-THREATENED

Chapada Diamantina – common on the plateau, halfway at the trail to the top of Pao Inacio.

The only endemic of Chapada Diamantina.

60. Surucua Trogon - *Trogon surrucura*

Boa Nova – 3 birds beautifully seen in the wet forest

61. Ringed Kingfisher - *Ceryle orquata*

Fairly common along the coast.

62. Amazon Kingfisher – *Chloroceryle amazona*

Small numbers.

63. Green Kingfisher – *Chloroceryle americana*

Small numbers.

64. Rufous-tailed Jacamar – *Galbula ruficauda*

Chapada Diamantina – fairly common in forest.

65. Spot-backed Puffbird – *Nystalus maculatus*

Dirtroad Jeremoabo-Canudos – one bird.

Boa Nova – one bird at the dry forest.

66. Crescent-chested Puffbird – *Malacoptila striata*

Boa Nova – excellent views of one bird in the wet forest.

67. White-fronted Nunbird – *Monasa morphoeus*

Una EcoParque – one bird at the canopy walkway.

68. Spot-billed Toucanet – *Selenidera maculirostris*

Porto Seguro Private Reserve – 8 birds.

69. Channel-billed Toucan – *Ramphastos vitellinus*

Porto Seguro Private Reserve – two birds.

Boa Nova – one bird at the wet forest.

E 70. Ochraceous Piculet – *Picumnus limea* – VULNERABLE

Boa Nova – two birds gave excellent views at close range in the wet forest and are tentatively identified as this species, although well out of range and habitat. Description: red patch on forehead, black nape with white spots, brown-green upperparts, buffish underparts unmarked (no stripes, spots, etc). Unknown population or...??? If you know more, please contact me.

E 71. Spotted Piculet – *Picumnus pygmaeus*

Boa Nova – small numbers in the wet forest.

72. Yellow-throated Woodpecker – *Piculus flavigula*

Boa Nova – common in wet forest. Local race in the NE has a RED throat!

73. Golden-green Woodpecker – *Piculus chrysochloros*

Chapada Diamantina – 3 birds at the trail near the B242, north of Lencois.

74. Plain-winged Woodcreeper – *Dendrocicla turdina*

Porto Seguro Private Reserve – one bird.

75. Wedge-billed Woodcreeper – *Glyphorhynchus spirurus*

Una EcoParque – one bird.

Boa Nova – one bird in the wet forest.

76. Buff-throated Woodcreeper – *Xiphorhynchus guttatus*

Boa Nova – one bird in the wet forest

77. Narrow-billed Woodcreeper – *Lepidocolaptes angustirostris*

Chapada Diamantina – one bird at the Great Xenops spot near Palmeiras.

78. Scaled Woodcreeper – *Lepidocolaptes squamatus*

Chapada Diamantina – one bird at the Great Xenops spot near Palmeiras.

Boa Nova – 2 birds in the wet forest.

79. Rufous Hornero – *Furnarius rufus*

Small numbers.

80. Pale-legged Hornero – *Furnarius leucopus*

Dirtroad Jeremoabo-Canudos – small numbers.

Chapada Diamantina – small numbers.

Boa Nova – one bird in the dry forest.

81. Wing-banded Hornero – *Furnarius figulus*

Chapada Diamantina – small numbers near marsh just north of Lencois.

E 82. Red-shouldered Spinetail – *Gyalophylax hellmayri* – NEAR-THREATENED

Canudos – fairly common along the dirtroad south of Canudos.

83. Ochre-cheeked Spinetail – *Poecilurus scutatus*

Boa Nova – at least one bird in the wet forest.

E 84. Bahia Spinetail – *Synallaxis whitneyi* – ENDANGERED

Chapada Diamantina – 1 bird at the trail near the B242, north of Lencois.

85. Pale-breasted Spinetail – *Synallaxis albescens*

Chapada Diamantina – small numbers near the marsh just north of Lencois.

86. Cinereous-breasted Spinetail – *Synallaxis hyospodia*

Boa Nova – fairly common in the wet forest.

87. Rufous-fronted Thornbird – *Phacellodomus rufifrons*

Chapada Diamantina – small numbers near the marsh just north of Lencois.

88. Striated Softtail – *Thriphoga macroura* – ENDANGERED

Boa Nova – at least 2 birds seen in the wet forest.

E 89. Caatinga Cacholote – *Pseudoseisura cristata*

Common.

90. Pale-browed Treehunter – *Cichocolaptes leucophrus*

Boa Nova – 3 birds in the wet forest.

91. White-eyed Foliage-Gleaner – *Automolus leucophthalmus*

Chapada Diamantina one bird at the Great Xenops spot near Palmeiras.

92. Plain Xenops – *Xenops minutus*

Boa Nova – 3 birds in the wet forest.

93. Great Antshrike – *Taraba major*

Canudos – one pair along the dirtroad south of Canudos.

Chapada Diamantina – one male near the marsh just north of Lencois.

E 94. Silvery-checked Antshrike – *Sakesphorus cristatus*

Boa Nova – 3 birds in the dry forest.

E 95. Caatinga (Barred) Antshrike – *Thamnophilus (doliatus) capistratus*

Canudos – one male along the dirtroad south of Canudos.

96. Ferruginous Antbird – *Drymophila ferruginea*

Boa Nova – 2 birds in the wet forest.

97. Ochre-rumped Antbird – *Drymophila ochropyga* – NEAR-THREATENED

Boa Nova – 4 birds in the wet forest.

98. Black-capped Antwren – *Herpsilochmus atricapillus*

Boa Nova – two birds in the wet forest.

E 99. Slender Antbird – *Rhopornis ardesiaca* – ENDANGERED

Boa Nova – 3 birds heard at the famous spot in the dry forest.

100. Streak-capped Antwren – *Terenura maculata*

Boa Nova – one bird in the wet forest.

101. Rio de Janeiro Antbird – *Cercomacra brasiliana* – NEAR-THREATENED

Boa Nova – 2 birds in the wet forest.

102. Crested Becard – *Pachyramphus validus*

Boa Nova – 1 bird in the wet forest.

103. Red-headed Manakin - *Pipra rubrocapilla*

Una EcoParque – one excellent bird.

104. Pin-tailed Manakin - *Ilicura militaris*

Boa Nova – wow! one male gave excellent views at close range in the wet forest.

105. Striped Manakin – *Machaeropterus regulus*

Una EcoParque – one excellent bird.

106. White-bearded Manakin – *Manacus manacus*

Una EcoParque – two birds seen.

107. Pale-bellied Manakin – *Neopelma pallescens*

Boa Nova – 3 birds in the wet forest.

108. White Monjita – *Xolmis irupero*

Dirtroad Jeremoabo-Canudos, Chapada Diamantina, Boa Nova – small numbers.

109. Black-backed or Pied Water-Tyrant *Fluvicola albiventer* / *pica*

Porto Seguro Private Reserve – small numbers.

Chapada Diamantina – small numbers near the marsh just north of Lencois.

110. Masked Water-Tyrant – *Fluvicola nengeta*

Common.

111. White-headed Marsh-Tyrant – *Arundinicola leucocephala*

Frequent near marshes.

112. Velvety Black-Tyrant – *Knipolegus nigerrimus*

Chapada Diamantina – common near the plateau, halfway at the trail to the top of Pao Inacio.

113. Yellow-browed Tyrant – *Satrapa icterophrys*

Chapada Diamantina – common near the marsh just north of Lencois.

114. Cattle Tyrant – *Machetornis rixosus*

Only one bird, on touristic island Ilha de Tinhare.

115. Tropical Kingbird – *Tyrannus melancholicus*

Common.

116. Variegated Flycatcher – *Empidonomus varius*

Chapada Diamantina – one bird near the marsh just north of Lencois.

117. Streaked Flycatcher – *Myiodinastes maculatus*

Boa Nova – 1 bird in the wet forest.

118. Boat-billed Flycatcher – *Megarhynchus pitangua*

Common.

119. Social Flycatcher – *Myiozetetes similis*

Common.

120. Piratic Flycatcher – *Legatus leucophaeus*

Canudos – one bird along the dirtroad south of Canudos.

121. Great Kiskadee – *Pitangus sulphuratus*

Common.

122. Lesser Kiskadee – *Philohydor lictor*

Common.

123. Grey-hooded Attila - *Attila rufus*

Boa Nova – one bird in the wet forest.

124. Cinereous Mourner – *Laniocera hypopyrrha*

Boa Nova – 3 birds in the wet forest.

125. Euler's Flycatcher – *Lathrotriccus euleri*

Chapada Diamantina – small numbers.

126. Fuscous Flycatcher – *Cnemotriccus fuscatus*

Boa Nova – one bird in wet forest.

127. Sulphur-rumped Flycatcher – *Myiobus barbatus*

Boa Nova – 1 bird in the wet forest.

128. Black-tailed Flycatcher – *Myiobus atricaudus*

Chapada Diamantina – one bird at the Great Xenops spot near Palmeiras.

129. Brown-crested Flycatcher – *Myiarchus tyrannulus*

Una EcoParque – one bird.

130. Tropical Pewee – *Contopus cinereus*

Chapada Diamantina – small numbers at the Great Xenops spot near Palmeiras.

131. Yellow-olive Flycatcher – *Tolmomyias sulphurescens*

Boa Nova – one bird at the dry forest.

132. Grey-headed Tody-Flycatcher – *Todirostrum poliocephalum*

Boa Nova – one bird in the wet forest.

133. Common Tody-Flycatcher – Todiostrom cinereum

Chapada Diamantina – common near the marsh just north of Lencois.

134. Pearly-vented Tody-Tyrant – Hemitriccus margaritaceiventer

Dirtroad Jeremoabo-Canudos – one bird encountered.

E 135. Bahia Tyrannulet – Phylloscartes beckeri – ENDANGERED

Boa Nova – 2 birds in the wet forest.

136. Pustalet's or Oustalet's Tyrannulet - Phylloscates oustaleti – NEAR-THREATENED

Boa Nova – at least one bird in the wet forest.

137. Grey-backed Tachuri – Polystrictus superciliaris

Chapada Diamantina – 2 birds near the plateau, halfway at the trail to the top of Pao Inacio.

E 138. Brazilian Wagtail-Tyrant – Stigmatura bahiae (split from Lesser Wagtail-Tyrant)

Canudos – small numbers along the dirtroad south of Canudos.

139. Yellow-bellied Elaenia – Elaenia flavogaster

Chapada Diamantina – only one bird seen.

140. Plain-crested Elaenia – Elaenia cristata

Chapada Diamantina – two birds at the Great Xenops spot near Palmeiras.

141. Greenish Elaenia – Myiopagis viridicata

Chapada Diamantina – two birds at the Great Xenops spot near Palmeiras.

142. Grey Elaenia – Myiopagis caniceps

Boa Nova – small numbers in the wet forest.

143. Mouse-coloured Tyrannulet – Phaeomyias murina

Canudos – at least one bird along the dirtroad south of Canudos.

144. Grey-capped Tyrannulet – Phyllomyias griseocapilla

Chapada Diamantina – one bird at the Great Xenops spot near Palmeiras.

145. White-winged Swallow – Tachycineta albiventer

Small numbers.

146. Rough-winged Swallow – Stelgodypteryx ruficollis

Common.

E 147. White-naped Jay – Cyanocorax cyanopogon

Canudos – fairly common along the dirtroad south of town.

Chapada Diamantina – small numbers.

148. Moustached Wren – Thryothorus genibarbis

Chapada Diamantina – 3 birds at the trail near the B242, north of Lencois.

149. House Wren – Troglodytes aedon

Small numbers.

150. Tropical Mockingbird – Mimus gilvus

Fairly common along the coast.

151. Chalk-browed Mockingbird – Mimus saturninus

Common.

152. Rufous-bellied Thrush – Turdus rufiventris

Common along the coast.

153. Pale-breasted Thrush – Turdus leucomelas

Porto Seguro Reserve, Una EcoParque – common.

154. Cocoa Thrush – Turdus fumigatus

Una EcoParque, forest near Praia do Forte – common.

155. Tropical Gnatcatcher – Polioptila plumbea

Canudos – fairly common along the dirtroad south of Canudos.

E 156. Grey-eyed Greenlet – Hylophilus amaurocephalus

Chapada Diamantina – small numbers at the Great Xenops spot near Palmeiras.

157. Shiny Cowbird - Molothrus bonariensis

Canudos – fairly common along the dirtroad south of Canudos.

E 158. Pale Bay-winged Cowbird – Molothrus fringillarius (split from Bay-winged Cowbird)

Dirtroad Jeremoabo-Canudos – small numbers.

159. Chopi Blackbird – Gnorimopsar chopi

Small numbers inland.

160. Chestnut-capped Blackbird – Agelaius ruficapillus

Chapada Diamantina – common near the marsh just north of Lencois.

161. Unicolored Blackbird - Agelaius cyanopus

Chapada Diamantina – small numbers.

162. Troupial - *Icterus icterus*

Small numbers.

163. White-browed Blackbird - *Leistus superciliaris*

Common in right habitat.

164. Tropical Parula – *Parula pitiayumi*

Boa Nova – small numbers at the dry forest.

165. Flavescent Warbler – *Basileuterus flaveolus*

Boa Nova – common in the wet forest.

166. Golden-crowned Warbler – *Basileuterus culicivorus*

Boa Nova – common in the wet forest.

167. River Warbler – *Basileuterus rivularis*

Chapada Diamantina – one bird identified as this species, near the marsh just north of Lencois.

168. Bananaquit – *Coereba flaveola*

Small numbers along the coast.

169. Chestnut-vented Conebill – *Conirostrum specoium*

Chapada Diamantina – small numbers in the forest just south of Lencois.

170. Blue Dacnis – *Dacnis cayana*

Chapada Diamantina – small numbers in the forest just south of Lencois.

171. Fawn-breasted Tanager – *Pipraeidea melanonota*

Boa Nova – one bird in the wet forest.

172. Burnished-buff Tanager – *Tangara cayana*

Small numbers along the coast.

173. Purple-throated Euphonia – *Euphonia chlorotica*

Chapada Diamantina – small numbers in the forest just south of Lencois.

174. Sayaca Tanager – *Thraupis sayaca*

Common.

175. Palm Tanager – *Thraupis palmarum*

Common along the coast.

176. Brazilian Tanager – *Ramphocelus bresilius*

Small numbers along the coast.

177. Red-crowned Ant-Tanager - *Habia rubica*

Boa Nova – two noisy flocks of 20 birds each in the wet forest.

178. Black-goggled Tanager – *Thrichothraupis melanops*

Boa Nova – one bird in the wet forest.

179. Hooded Tanager – *Nemosia pileata*

One bird at the forest near touristic site Praia do Forte.

180. Guira Tanager – *Hemithraupis guira*

Chapada Diamantina – small numbers in the forest just south of Lencois.

181. Orange-headed Tanager – *Thlypopsis sordida*

Chapada Diamantina – small numbers near the marsh just south of Lencois.

182. Black-throated Grosbeak – *Pitylus fuliginosus*

Boa Nova – one bird in the wet forest.

183. Greyish Saltator – *Saltator coerulescens*

Dirtroad Jeremoabo-Canudos – one bird.

184. Black-throated Saltator – *Saltator atricollis*

Fairly common inland.

185. Ultramarine Grosbeak – *Passerina brissonni*

Canudos – one along the dirtroad south of Canudos.

186. Sooty Grassquit – *Tiaris fuliginosa*

Common in suitable habitat.

E 187. Red-cowled Cardinal – *Paroaria dominicana*

Common in open areas.

188. Lineated Seedeater – *Sporophila lineola*

Chapada Diamantina – 4 birds at the reedbeds along the river, near the marsh just south of Lencois.

189. Yellow-bellied Seedeater – *Sporophila nigricollis*

Fairly common.

E 190. White-throated Seedeater – *Sporophila albogularis*

Dirtroad Jeremoabo-Canudos – one bird.

191. Pileated Finch – *Coryphospingus pileatus*

Common in open areas.

E 192. Sao Francisco Sparrow – *Arremon franciscanus* – NEAR-THREATENED

Chapada Diamantina – an excellent sighting of two birds at the Great Xenops spot near Palmeiras.

193. Pectoral Sparrow – *Arremon taciturnus*

Boa Nova – 3 birds in the wet forest.

194. Saffron-billed Sparrow – *Arremon flavirostris*

Canudos – a pair near town.

195. Grassland Sparrow – *Ammodramus humeralis*

Dirtroad Jeremoabo-Canudos – small numbers.

196. Rufous-collared Sparrow – *Zonotrichia capensis*

Small numbers inland. Common at Chapada Diamantina.

E 197. Buff-throated Pampa-Finch – *Embernagra longicauda* – NEAR-THREATENED

Chapada Diamantina – common at the plateau, halfway at the trail to the top of Pao Inacio.

198. House Sparrow – *Passer domesticus*

Common near settlements.
