Horned Screamer (*Anhima cornuta*) – two birds at Manglares - Churute. My first new bird family of the trip

Snail Kite (*Rostrhamus sociabilis*) – immature bird seen at Manglares-Churute

Plumbeous Kite (*Ictinia plumbea*)

Plain-breasted Hawk (*Accipiter ventralis*) - seen well at Utuana and Cajanuma

Crane Hawk (*Geranospiza caerulescens*) - Cerro Blanco

Gray-backed Hawk (*Leucopternis occidentalis*) – seen a couple of times at Buenaventura including a bird soaring with a Barred Hawk

Barred Hawk (*Leucopternis princes*) - a single bird at Buenaventura

Savanna Hawk (*Buteogallus meridionalis*) – reasonably common in western lowlands

Great Black-Hawk (*Buteogallus urubitinga*) – brilliant views of a perched bird at Buenaventura. A certain amount of persuasion was required to get it to fly and show off the all important tail pattern...

PIGEONS AND DOVES

Rock Pigeon (*Columba livia*)
Band-tailed Pigeon (*Columba fasciata*)
Pale-vented Pigeon (*Columba cayennensis*)
Plumbeous Pigeon (*Columba plumbea*)
Eared Dove (*Zenaida auriculata*)
Ecuadorian Ground-Dove (*Columbina buckleyi*) – very common at Cerro Blanco
Croaking Ground-Dove (*Columbina cruziana*) – several seen by the runway at Catamayo.
Blue Ground-Dove (*Claravis pretiosa*) – a pair perched in a tree at Jorupe was a very nice surprise
White-tipped Dove (*Leptotila verreauxi*)

PARROTS AND MACAWS

Red-masked Parakeet (*Aratinga erythrogenys*) – quite common as fly-by birds in the Buenaventura. Finally found some perched at Jorupe
Golden-plumed Parakeet (*Leptosittaca branickii*) – Tapichalaca has some roosting trees which we staked out one evening. One bird gave superb views before very quickly disappearing into the roosting chamber but we were seriously concerned that it wasn't going to show.....
White-breasted Parakeet (*Pyrrhura albipectus*) – six birds flew over just as we were watching the fly-by Amazonian Umbrellabird. The parakeets were relocated in a tree and gave brilliant views – the Umbrellabird was never seen again...
Pacific Parrotlet (*Forpus coelestis*) – very common in the west
Gray-cheeked Parakeet (*Brotogeris pyrrhopterus*) – great views at El Empalme
Bronze-winged Parrot (*Pionus chalcopterus*)
Red-lored Amazon (*Amazona autumnalis*) – fly-overs at Cerro Blanco
Scaly-naped Amazon (*Amazona mercenaria*) – fly-overs at Tapichalaca

CUCKOOS AND ANIS

Squirrel Cuckoo (*Piaya cayana*)
Smooth-billed Ani (*Crotophaga ani*)
Groove-billed Ani (*Crotophaga sulcirostris*)

TYPICAL OWLS

Pacific Pygmy-Owl (*Glaucidium peruanum*)
Black-and-white Owl (*Strix nigrolineata*) – watched at the well-known stake-out at Buenaventura

NIGHTJARS & NIGHTHAWKS

Pauraque (*Nyctidromus albicollis*) – nice views of a young bird on the road at Buenaventura being attended by 2 adults

Blackish Nightjar (*Caprimulgus nigrescens*) – one on the road to Rio Bombuscaro gave prolonged close-range views

SWIFTS

White-collared Swift (*Streptoprocne zonaris*)

Chestnut-collared Swift (*Streptoprocne rutilus*) – quite an attractive bird when seen well. Seeing them well is another matter.....

Tumbes Swift (*Chaetura ocybetes*) – finally came low enough at Jorupe to be identified

HUMMINGBIRDS

White-whiskered Hermit (*Phaethornis yaruqui*)

Green Hermit (*Phaethornis guy*) – Rio Bombuscaro

Baron's Hermit (*Phaethornis baroni*) – Buenaventura feeders

Gray-chinned Hermit (*Phaethornis griseogularis*) – Jorupe & Bombuscaro. Seems to have a strange range which extends to both slopes in just southern Ecuador

White-tipped Sicklebill (*Eutoxeres aquila*) – after watching almost every Heliconia in the Buenaventura valley we finally pinned this one down on the last day

White-necked Jacobin (*Florisuga mellivora*)

Brown Violet-ear (*Colibri delphinae*)

Violet-headed Hummingbird (*Klais guimeti*) – only seen at Copalinga farm

Wire-crested Thorntail (*Popelairia popelairii*) – only females at the Copalinga feeders

Green Thorntail (*Popelairia conversii*)

Fork-tailed Woodnymph (*Thalurania furcata*)

Emerald-bellied Woodnymph (*Thalurania hypochlora*) – common at the Buenaventura feeders

Violet-bellied Hummingbird (*Damophila julie*) - common at the Buenaventura feeders

Golden-tailed Sapphire (*Chrysuronia oenone*) – a nice male at the Copalinga Inga trees

Tumbes Hummingbird (*Leucippus baeri*) – El Empalme

Rufous-tailed Hummingbird (*Amazilia tzacatl*)

Amazilia Hummingbird (*Amazilia amazilia*) – one in the centre of Macara. This is the highland “alticola” race which may be split in the future as Loja Hummingbird

Andean Emerald (*Amazilia franciae*)

Glittering-throated Emerald (*Amazilia fimbriata*) – common at the Copalinga feeders

White-vented Plumeleteer (*Chalybura buffonii*) - Buenaventura feeders

Speckled Hummingbird (*Adelomyia melanogenys*)

Ecuadorian Piedtail (*Phlogophilus hemileucurus*) – not easy but views of a perched bird eventually achieved at Bombuscaro near to the entrance

Green-crowned Brilliant (*Heliodoxa jacula*)

Violet-fronted Brilliant (*Heliodoxa leadbeateri*) – common at the Copalinga feeders

Black-throated Brilliant – female at the Copalinga feeders. This is the place to see this bird

Fawn-breasted Brilliant (*Heliodoxa rubinoides*)

Giant Hummingbird (*Patagona gigas*) – Wow ! Last minute sighting in Cajas before we descended back to Guayaquil

Shining Sunbeam (*Aglaeactis cupripennis*)

Mountain Velvetbreast (*Lafresnaya lafresnayi*)

Great Sapphirewing (*Pterophanes cyanopterus*)

Bronzy Inca (*Coeligena coeligena*) - Tapichalaca

Collared Inca (*Coeligena torquata*)

Buff-winged Starfrontlet (*Coeligena lutetiae*)

Rainbow Starfrontlet (*Coeligena iris*) – absolutely loads of these beauties at the feeders at Utuana

Chestnut-breasted Coronet (*Boissonneaua matthewsii*) – Tapichalaca is the place for these. Loads at the feeders

Amethyst-throated Sunangel (*Heliangelus amethysticollis*) - - Tapichalaca. Completed my set of Ecuadorian Sunangels

Flame-throated Sunangel (*Heliangelus micrastur*) - Tapichalaca

Purple-throated Sunangel (*Heliangelus viola*) – several at the Utuana feeders

Glowing Puffleg (*Eriocnemis vestitus*) – several of these whizzing around at Cajanuma

Booted Racket-tail (*Ocreatus underwoodii*)

Green-tailed Trainbearer (*Lesbia nuna*) - Sozoranga

Viridian Metaltail (*Metallura williami*) – great views of a perched bird at Acanama

Violet-throated Metaltail (*Metallura baroni*) – several in Cajas NP

Tyrian Metaltail (*Metallura tyrianthina*)

Rufous-capped Thornbill (*Chalcostigma ruficeps*) – one very attractive male managed to slip past the very aggressive Chestnut-breasted Coronets at Tapichalaca

Blue-mantled Thornbill (*Chalcostigma stanleyi*)

Long-tailed Sylph (*Aglaiocercus kingi*)

Violet-tailed Sylph (*Aglaiocercus coelestis*)

Purple-crowned Fairy (*Heliodytes barroti*)

Long-billed Starthroat (*Helimaster longirostris*) – very nice bird. Seen on odd occasions on both slopes

White-bellied Woodstar (*Acestrura mulsant*) – Tapichalaca feeders

TROGONS AND QUETZALS

Golden-headed Quetzal (*Pharomachrus auriceps*)

Ecuadorian Trogon (*Trogon mesurus*) – at least 2 birds at Jorupe.

Northern Violaceous Trogon (*Trogon caligatus*) – Cerro Blanco

KINGFISHERS

Ringed Kingfisher (*Megaceryle torquata*)

MOTMOTS

Highland Motmot (*Momotus aequatorialis*) - Bombuscaro

JACAMARS

Coppery-chested Jacamar (*Galbula pastazae*) – one very wet bird at Bombuscaro near to the entrance

PUFFBIRDS

Black-streaked Puffbird (*Malacoptila fulvogularis*) - Bombuscaro

Lanceolated Monklet (*Micromonacha lanceolata*) - a fantastic find by Scott at the start of the Loja – Zamora road. Definitely one of the top ten birds of the trip

NEW WORLD BARBETS

Red-headed Barbet (*Eubucco bourcierii*)

TOUCANS

Emerald Toucanet (*Aulacorhynchus prasinus*) – sub-species “cyanolaemus”. Clements calls this Andean Toucanet. Still a nice bird whatever it's name is

Pale-mandibled Araçari (*Pteroglossus erythrogygius*)

Gray-breasted Mountain-Toucan (*Andigena hypoglauca*) - a pair at Cajanuma showed really well

Black-billed Mountain-Toucan (*Andigena nigrirostris*) - a big surprise ! One landed directly above us while waiting for the Jocotoco Antpitta to appear.

WOODPECKERS & PICULETS Picidae

Lafresnaye's Piculet (*Picumnus lafresnayi*) – reasonably frequent in Bombuscaro

Olivaceous Piculet (*Picumnus olivaceus*)

Ecuadorian Piculet (*Picumnus sclateri*) – Cerro Blanco appears to be the best site to nail this brilliant little bird

Crimson-mantled Woodpecker (*Piculus rivolii*) – not a lifer but I could never get tired of seeing these beauties. Surprisingly common at Cajanuma

Golden-olive Woodpecker (*Piculus rubiginosus*)

Yellow-tufted Woodpecker (*Melanerpes cruentatus*)

Little Woodpecker (*Veniliornis passerinus*)

Scarlet-backed Woodpecker (*Veniliornis callonotus*)

Guayaquil Woodpecker (*Campephilus gayaquilensis*)

OVENBIRDS

Bar-winged Cinclodes (*Cinclodes fuscus*)

Stout-billed Cinclodes (*Cinclodes excelsior*)

Pacific Hornero (*Furnarius cinnamomeus*)

Andean Tit-Spinetail (*Leptasthenura andicola*)

Azara's Spinetail (*Synallaxis azarae*)

Blackish-headed Spinetail (*Synallaxis tithys*) – good views at Jorupe

Rufous Spinetail (*Synallaxis unirufa*)

Ash-browed Spinetail (*Craniroleuca curtata*) – Tapichalaca along the Palanda Road

Mouse-colored Thistletail (*Schizoeaca griseomurina*) – seen well at the very foggy Sabanilla Ridge.

Also several seen at Cajas

Many-striped Canastero (*Asthenes flammulata*)

Equatorial Graytail (*Xenerpestes singularis*) – Bombuscaro on two dates

Streaked Tuftedcheek (*Pseudocolaptes boissonneautii*)

Pacific Tuftedcheek (*Pseudocolaptes johnsoni*) – a good bird to get. Great views of one at Buenaventura

Spotted Barbtail (*Premnoplex brunnescens*)

Scaly-throated Foliage-gleaner (*Anabacerthia variegaticeps*) - Buenaventura

Montane Foliage-gleaner (*Anabacerthia striaticollis*) – **Bombuscaro and the Loja-Zamora road**
Henna-hooded Foliage-gleaner (*Hylodytes erythrocephalus*) – good but brief views at both Cerro Blanco and Jorupe
Streaked Xenops (*Xenops rutilans*)
Plain Xenops (*Xenops minutus*)

WOODCREEPERS

Wedge-billed Woodcreeper (*Glyphorhynchus spirurus*)
Olivaceous Woodcreeper (*Sittasomus griseicapillus*)
Spotted Woodcreeper (*Xiphorhynchus erythropygius*)
Olive-backed Woodcreeper (*Xiphorhynchus triangularis*) – appears to replace Spotted in east.
Seen at Bombuscaro
Streak-headed Woodcreeper (*Lepidocolaptes souleyetii*)
Montane Woodcreeper (*Lepidocolaptes lacrymiger*)
Red-billed Scythebill (*Campylorhamphus trochilirostris*) – Jorupe only

TYPICAL ANTBIRDS

Collared Antshrike (*Sakesphorus bernardi*) – nice males seen at Cerro Blanco and Jorupe
Lined Antshrike (*Thamnophilus tenuipunctatus*) – a nice singing / displaying bird seen at the start of the Loja-Zamora road
Chapman's Antshrike (*Thamnophilus zarumae*) – male & female birds seen at Utuana
Uniform Antshrike (*Thamnophilus unicolor*)
Western Slaty-Antshrike (*Thamnophilus atrinucha*)
Plain Antvireo (*Dysithamnus mentalis*) – Cerro Blanco
Checker-throated Antwren (*Myrmotherula fulviventris*) – seen well in the lower Buenaventura valley
Slaty Antwren (*Myrmotherula schisticolor*)
Yellow-breasted Antwren (*Herpsilochmus axillaris*) – singing bird watched well along the Loja-Zamora road. Nice tail movement....
Chestnut-backed Antbird (*Myrmeciza exsul*)

ANTTHRUSHES & ANTPITTAS

Watkins's Antpitta (*Grallaria watkinsi*) – excellent views at both Jorupe and Sozoranga
Jocotoco Antpitta (*Grallaria ridgelyi*) – Following the success of the Antpitta feeding at Angels Paz's place in the North, the Jocotoco foundation sent one of their rangers (Franco ?) to see how the feeding was done. About two weeks before our visit the first people visiting Tapichalaca were able to watch the Jocotoco's being fed worms. The experience is absolutely fantastic. Franco starts by digging for worms and continues to make digging noises for a while afterwards. This apparently inspires the Antpitta to make towards the feeding area. Franco then sits by the path and calls to the bird. After about 20 minutes we were able to watch as he threw worms to the bird. The bird proceeded to rise through the foliage to eye-level (at a range of about 3 metres) where it called constantly with the worm hanging from its bill. A stunning **CMF** in anyone's terms ! We later spoke to Franco and he said that he saw 3 birds after we had left the site !
Chestnut-naped Antpitta (*Grallaria nuchalis*) – Antpitta feeding Part 2 !!. About 200 metres further along the trail from the Jocotoco Franco left some worms on a large leaf and asked us to retreat about 50 metres away. After 5 minutes a Chestnut-naped Antpitta hopped nonchalantly along the trail and started eating the worms.
[As an aside Franco also has a White-throated Quail-Dove that takes worms off a leaf but it is too shy to perform at the moment !]
Tawny Antpitta (*Grallaria quitensis*) – hopping around in true Tawny Antpitta-style at Cajas

GNATEATERS

Chestnut-crowned Gnateater (*Conopophaga castaneiceps*) – superb views of a male at Bombuscaro. My second new family of the trip.

TAPACULOS

Elegant Crescentchest (*Melanopareia elegans*) – superb views of a superb bird at Jorupe
Uncoloured Tapaculo (*Scytalopus unicolor*) - Utuana
No. White-crowned Tapaculo (*Scytalopus atratus*) – one under the feeders at Copalinga gave prolonged views rather than the usual "black shape responding to a tape" scenario
Páramo Tapaculo (*Scytalopus canus*) – one along the Zumba road

TYRANT FLYCATCHERS

Black-capped Tyrannulet (*Phyllomyias nigrocapillus*)
Tawny-rumped Tyrannulet (*Phyllomyias uropygialis*) – an easy tyrannulet for a change
Golden-faced Tyrannulet (*Zimmerius chrysops*)
Loja Tyrannulet (*Zimmerius flavidifrons*) – there is quite an appreciable difference between this and the previous species

Southern Beardless-Tyrannulet (*Camptostoma obsoletum*)
Tumbesian Tyrannulet (*Phaeomyias tumbezana*)
Pacific Elaenia (*Myiopagis subplacens*)
Greenish Elaenia (*Myiopagis viridicata*)
Mottle-backed Elaenia (*Elaenia gigas*)
White-crested Elaenia (*Elaenia albiceps*)
White-throated Tyrannulet (*Mecocerculus leucophrys*)
White-tailed Tyrannulet (*Mecocerculus poecilocercus*)
Tufted Tit-Tyrant (*Anairetes parulus*)
Black-crested Tit-Tyrant (*Anairetes nigrocristatus*) – there are several birds in the field guide that simply don't do the bird justice. This is definitely one of these. A brilliant little bird seen along the aptly named "Black-crested Tit-Tyrant" trail at Utuana
Tawny-crowned Pygmy-Tyrant (*Euscarthmus meloryphus*) – great views at El Empalme
Olive-striped Flycatcher (*Mionectes olivaceus*)
Slaty-capped Flycatcher (*Leptopogon superciliaris*)
Ecuadorian Tyrannulet (*Phylloscartes gualaquizae*)
Scale-crested Pygmy-Tyrant (*Lophotriccus pileatus*) – still a brilliant bird
Black-throated Tody-Tyrant (*Hemitriccus granadensis*) - a very obliging individual showed down to about 2 metres at **Cajanuma**
Common Tody-Flycatcher (*Todirostrum cinereum*)
Yellow-olive Flatbill (*Tolmomyias sulphurescens*)
Olive-faced Flatbill (*Tolmomyias viridiceps*)
Ornate Flycatcher (*Myiobius ornatus*)
Ruddy-tailed Flycatcher (*Terentriacus erythrurus*) – Good views at Rio Bombuscaro. A little higher than the field guide suggests
Tawny-breasted Flycatcher (*Myiobius villosus*) – at both Buenaventura & Bombuscaro
Orange-crested Flycatcher (*Myiophobus phoenicomitra*)
Bran-colored Flycatcher (*Myiophobus fasciatus*)
Olive-chested Flycatcher (*Myiophobus cryptoxanthus*)
Orange-banded Flycatcher (*Myiophobus lintoni*)
Cinnamon Flycatcher (*Pyrrhomyias cinnamomea*)
Western Wood-Pewee (*Contopus sordidulus*)
Tumbes Pewee (*Contopus punensis*)
Olive-sided Flycatcher (*Contopus cooperi*)
Black Phoebe (*Sayornis nigricans*)
Vermilion Flycatcher (*Pyrocephalus rubinus*)
Brown-backed Chat-Tyrant (*Ochthoeca fumicolor*)
Rufous-breasted Chat-Tyrant (*Ochthoeca rufipectoralis*) several at **Cajanuma**
Slaty-backed Chat-Tyrant (*Ochthoeca cinnamomeiventris*)
Jelski's Chat-Tyrant (*Silvicultrix jelskii*) – one elusive bird at Utuana
Yellow-bellied Chat-Tyrant (*Silvicultrix diadema*)
Red-rumped Bush-Tyrant (*Cnemarchus erythropygius*) – about a week before the trip Wes & Susan had found one of these at Cajas. The bird was on exactly the same sapling on this visit !
Streak-throated Bush-Tyrant (*Myiotheretes striaticollis*)
Smoky Bush-Tyrant (*Myiotheretes fumigatus*)
Cliff Flycatcher (*Hirundinea ferruginea*) – two at the very start of the Old Loja-Zamora road
Black-billed Shrike-Tyrant (*Agriornis montana*) – one seen through the early morning fog at Cajas and then another at the ranger station showing much better
Paramo Ground-Tyrant (*Muscisaxicola alpina*)
Rufous-tailed Tyrant (*Knipolegus poecilurus*) – nice views of one along the road near Valladolid
Long-tailed Tyrant (*Colonia colonus*) – Copalinga farm
Masked Water-Tyrant (*Fluvicola nengeta*)
Pale-edged Flycatcher (*Myiarchus cephalotes*)
Sooty-crowned Flycatcher (*Myiarchus phaeocephalus*)
Social Flycatcher (*Myiozetetes similis*)
Rusty-margined Flycatcher (*Myiozetetes cayanensis*)
Streaked Flycatcher (*Myiodynastes maculates*)
Baird's Flycatcher (*Myiodynastes bairdii*) – big, distinctive flycatchers. Seen only at El Empalme
Golden-crowned Flycatcher (*Myiodynastes chrysocephalus*)
Piratic Flycatcher (*Legatus leucophaeus*)
Tropical Kingbird (*Tyrannus melancholicus*)
Yellow-cheeked Becard (*Pachyramphus xanthogenys*) – great views along the road below Valladolid
Slaty Becard (*Pachyramphus spodiurus*) – a couple of pairs at Jorupe
Black-and-white Becard (*Pachyramphus albogriseus*)
One-colored Becard (*Pachyramphus homochrous*)

COTINGAS

Red-crested Cotinga (*Ampelion rubrocristata*)

Barred Fruiteater (*Pipreola arcuata*)

Green-and-black Fruiteater (*Pipreola riefferii*)

Amazonian Umbrellabird (*Cephalopterus ornatus*) – a fly-by at Bombuscaro

Long-wattled Umbrellabird (*Cephalopterus penduliger*) – fantastic bird with a fantastic Latin name.

In this case the bird's penduliger was way below the branch he was perched on

Andean Cock-of-the-rock (*Rupicola peruviana*)

MANAKINS

Blue-rumped Manakin (*Lepidothrix isidorei*) – lovely male at Bombuscaro

Club-winged Manakin (*Machaeropterus deliciosus*)
